The Refocused Message – Two Years Later


In the February 2021 newsletter, the NVL announced our transition from a historic preservation focus to be more of a thought leader and agent for change. We decided on this approach to make the Nisei Soldier story more relevant to the issues of today and appeal to the younger generations. While retaining our commitment to historical content, we sought to expand our perspective to include larger, current day events affecting our community.

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orking with Nathan Hokama of Strategic Communications Solutions, we developed a series of message themes to support this new focus to guide our communications and educational components. In this issue we are updating you, our supporters, on how we incorporated our message themes.

The message themes developed to support the new focus are the foundation for our educational content and outreach efforts. They are:

- » Values such as loyalty, honor, and patriotism influenced young Nisei (second generation Japanese Americans) to serve in the military during World War II despite overt prejudice and discrimination against them.
- » After the war, having proven their loyalty beyond all doubt, Nisei Veterans worked with Hawaii's unique multi-ethnic coalitions to break down the institutional barriers of the "plantation society" and create a more equitable society.
- » Understanding and perpetuating the Nisei Soldier legacy can inspire current and future generations to continue fighting for racial and social equality, and justice for all.




NVL board meeting and discussed their organization and programs and then-NVL President Heirakuji also attended one of their board meetings to share our programs.

In February 2022, we supported the JACL special event for the Day of Remembrance to commemorate the 80th

anniversary of the signing of Executive Order 9066 which authorized the evacuation and incarceration of over 110,000 Nikkei from the military areas on the West Coast based solely on their ethnicity.

Yamaga is now the President of the JACL Honolulu Chapter and will be the Keynote Speaker at the annual Nisei Soldier Memorial Service in September.

Also in 2022, we donated \$5,000 to advance the publishing of William Kaneko's book about the forced relocation of Japanese families during World War II due to their proximity to military bases. The book is expected to be published later this year.



In September 2022, we coordinated a book event with the group, A Discussion on Race and Ethnicity or ADORE, about Tom Coffman's book, "Inclusion: How Hawaii Protected Japanese Americans from Mass Internment, Transformed Itself, and Changed America". The book documents how an inclusive community worked



to protect an embattled segment of its population during World War II (WWII), the Nikkei.

We also supported the Densho fundraiser events in 2021 and 2022. Densho is a non-profit based in Seattle dedicated to

preserving the story of the Nikkei incarceration during WWII and motivating young people to become advocates for fair and equitable treatment of all ethnicities.

Vice President Byrnes Yamashita is writing a series of articles about Hawaii families that experienced incarceration *Continues on page 2.*

during WWII for the *Hawaii Herald*. The aim of the series is to increase the understanding of what these families experienced so that people here in Hawaii, which largely escaped the mass incarceration, can have more empathy for them and be moved to advocate for others.

The NVL website was completely revamped in 2022 under the guidance of Heirakuji to reflect these themes. These changes completed the transition to the new educational focus.


The next themes were aimed at reaching the Japanese audience here in Hawaii and in Japan:

- » Cultural values of the Hawaii Nikkei helped Nisei Soldiers overcome hardships and achieve major victories on and off the battlefield.
- » Nisei Veterans played a key role in healing the wounds of war between the U.S. and Japan, as well as, in rebuilding and solidifying the cultural and economic relationship between Hawaii and Japan.

Vice President Yamashita presented these themes to middle school students from Usa City, Japan in 2021 and 2022 via online meetings. In September 2022, the NVL was presented a Certificate of Appreciation and donation from the Hawaii Aloha Life Enrichment (HALE) association for our contributions in fostering relations between Japan and the U.S. HALE is a non-profit organization whose members are primarily Japanese and interested in Hawaiian culture and history.

These themes were also included in a presentation to the Rainbow Kids from Japan in March 2023 at the 100th Infantry Battalion clubhouse. The Rainbow Kids are orphans from the 2011 Fukushima Earthquake and Tsunami. Students from Iolani School also attended the presentation.

In summary, the transition to the new messages and themes has been completed over the past two years and we are committed to this direction in establishing the relevance to the Nisei Soldier story to modern times. We hope that you agree.

This year, the NVL provided \$2,000 in scholarship donations to fourteen cadets in four local JROTC programs in recognition of their support of the Nisei Soldier legacy and commitment to upholding strong citizenship values. SAGE TOTTORI INITIATES A PUNCHBOWL GRAVESITE LOCATOR PROJECT

Boy Scout Sage Tottori noticed many families struggling to find their loved one's gravesite at Punchbowl. A senior at Island Pacific Academy, Tottori, shown below with NVL's Lynn Heirakuji, was on the hunt for a project to earn Eagle Scout status and was inspired to help those families he'd seen at the cemetery.

Sage reached out to then-NVL President Heirakuji (see photo at right) who began contacting various Nisei veterans groups in the state to compile a list of names of those buried at Punchbowl. Using the list, Sage and his mother Kimberly spent Sundays looking for and geo-tagging 100th Infantry Battalion, 442nd



Regimental Combat Team, 1399th Engineer Construction Battalion or Military Intelligence Service gravesites. They were later joined by friends and family to hasten the process for some 1,800 graves.

For Heirakuji, the most exciting thing about the project was that it was carried out by Tottori and other community youths. "It's the youth who will perpetuate the legacy of the Nisei Soldiers — local youth who are finding the Nisei Soldier story so interesting that they want to do something like this," she said.

EDUCATIONAL CURRICULUM

Director Micah Benevitz, a Mililani High School history teacher, is developing a curriculum about the Nisei Soldiers that will include an animated video created by Director Bill Wright about the 522nd Field



Artillery Battalion. Bill's father served as Executive Officer of the 522 FAB.

In addition to the new curriculum, NVL representatives also make presentations to student groups along with military and civic organizations.

NISEI IMPACT YOUTH JOURNALISM PROGRAM

The NVL partnered with the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* in an educational project which taught youth about journalism and the Nisei Soldier story. Five high school students participated and wrote stories about Nisei Soldiers. A recognition ceremony was held at the Maunalani Nursing and Rehab Center where two of the Nisei veterans who were interviewed resided.





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
