## **NVL Presents the 18th Annual Nisei Soldiers Memorial Service at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (Punchbowl)**


The Nisei Veterans Legacy will honor the nisei soldiers who bravely served in World War II at the 18th annual Nisei Soldiers Memorial Service at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (Punchbowl) on Sunday, Sept. 24, 2023, beginning at 9:30 am. The ceremony is free and open to the public.

The annual ceremony is being presented in partnership with other local nisei veteran organizations, including the 100th Infantry Battalion Veterans Organization, 442nd Regimental Combat Team, and the Military Intelligence Service.

The event's keynote speaker is **Minda Yamaga**, a senior litigator in the Office of the Federal Public Defender, District of Hawai'i, and board president of the Japanese American Citizens League, Honolulu Chapter. Yamaga's mother was born at the Heart Mountain Relocation Center in Wyoming, where Japanese Americans were incarcerated after the 1941 bombing of Oahu.

**Jon Teraizumi**, senior vice president with Central Pacific Bank and grandson of nisei veteran **Makoto Kunimune**, will emcee the ceremony.

This year's event carries on the tradition of celebrating the unquenchable spirit of the nisei soldiers with a presentation of colors, wreaths, songs, and a rifle salute. The 111th Army Band, student presenters, and Junior ROTC cadets will also participate in the annual event.





The memorial service will be broadcast live on Sunday, Sept. 24, beginning at 9:30 am on 'Ōlelo, channel 53. You can also watch the event on facebook.com/olelocommunity. After Oct. 23, the memorial service can be viewed on-demand at olelo.org/olelonet/ Search "nisei."

## **Hawaii Student Receives Award for MIS Documentary**

A documentary, Military Intelligence Service: A Frontier to Fight Prejudice, produced by one of his students, **Althea "Allie" Juan**, received an award at the National History Day finals in Washington, D.C. in June 2023. She also received a scholarship for her work.

Benavitz, whose grandfather was in the Military Intelligence Service (MIS) and whose granduncle was in the 100th Infantry Battalion, chaperoned a Hawaii contingent of students to the event.

Juan's 10-minute video explains how nisei soldiers in the MIS used their knowledge of the Japanese language and culture to support the war effort. However, because of the secret nature of their work, the MIS was never fully recognized. Juan notes that the lessons learned from the past are shaping current policies. For example, nisei advised President George Bush against discriminatory policies and practices of Muslims after the 9/11 terrorist attacks.
